UMW April Outing

On April 9 the UMW, along with friends and family members were treated to a fun and educational trip to the Tucson Wildlife Center. With everything from bunnies to bobcats to owls, the center does a magnificent job of saving the lives of injured animals. The facilities include a hospital, appropriate living quarters for the different species, and even exercise areas for large birds.

The goal is always to heal the animal and then return it to a safe area in its native habitat. However, if it is determined that the animal will not be able to take care of itself if released, it will have a permanent home, either at the Center or a similar facility.

The Center provides care for thousands of animals each year, serving all of southern Arizona and beyond, and maintains service around the clock. Meet a fellow UMW member

My name is Wanda Chittenden and I was born in Warsaw, Missouri and lived in Missouri until I graduated from college. I still go barefoot as much as possible!!! My father was a meat cutter and my mother had many jobs, from being a school cook to taking in ironing. Raised Southern Baptist, it was my mother who made sure that we were grounded in the church, attending Sunday School and worship on Sunday morning and worship Sunday evening. As a high school student, I sang in the choir, served as pianist and taught Sunday School.

When I went away to college at Central Missouri State, now University of Central Missouri, my involvement in church diminished. Even with scholarships, I knew that I would need to work many hours to pay my own way through college, which was my only option, so week-end time was spent working. I attended summer school, thus finishing my Bachelor's degree in Education in 3 years, and was offered a graduate teaching position, so finished my Master's in the fourth year.

With a major in Health, Physical Education and Recreation my first teaching position was in Sioux City, Iowa. After one year, I was invited to apply for a faculty position at Westmar College, LeMars, Iowa, which was affiliated with the Evangelical United Brethren Church. "I" Schluchter is a Westmar alum. Dave Chittenden, and Del Schluchter attended there one year before returning to North Dakota. I began attending the "college" church. Dave was teaching math and coaching in LeMars, and a romance began. In 1968, two important mergers occurred. The EUB church and the Methodist church merged to become what we are today--The United Methodist Church....and on September 11, 1968, Dave and I became Mr. and Mrs.

Dave continued teaching math and coaching in LeMars, becoming the head football coach in 1975, until 1982. I continued to teach at Westmar, and with the help of Title IX started the women's athletic program there, coaching volleyball and softball in addition to teaching classes. We were active in Calvary UMC which remained the campus church.

Open House at Sister Jose Women's cont.

The mission of Sister Jose Women's Center is dedicated to the care and nurture of homeless women in a welcoming environment. This facility was an old warehouse on Park Avenue which has been restored for and by this group. The Center is located at 1050 S. Park (22nd St. and Park) providing breakfast and lunch to 95-100 homeless women daily and has a sleeping area of up to 35 women. There are showers available and also washing machines with a clothes yard for hanging laundry. Adjacent to the clothes line is a dog run. Many of the ladies have small dogs for protection on the streets – especially at night. We could peek through screens and see the residents for that night with their sleeping things enjoying a pizza party.

Four of our ladies from DSUMW visited their previous facility which was a small house not in a very good area where they could not cook, had room for 13 ladies (at the most) to spend the night, and where there were no "learning" facilities.

During our recent tour, Sandra showed us the beautiful patio with newly planted flower beds, tables and chairs that provide a serene atmosphere away from the elements in the streets. A beautiful hand painted mural on the back wall of the building completes the scene and provides much needed relaxation. They have a library; they are teaching ladies to sew; and more; plus there is program - CREATE - that is working with the women towards "moving forward" with their lives where they learn life skills, rebuild their personal identity and chart their path forward in a supportive setting.

They have a "store" where gently used clothing is cleaned and sized and made available to the ladies, who are able to choose 2 blouses and 2 pants per week and a pair of shoes once a month. Personal items are also available. Here is wish list of items needed:

Ladies clothes: new socks, underwear/bras, sweatshirts/pants, coats, gloves, hats, scarves, walking shoes, pants, t-shirts, blouses, shorts. Seasonal clothing only, please.

Personal Care: Shampoo, conditioner, hand soap/sanitizer, body wash, deodorant, feminine hygiene products, disposable razors, new brushes/combs, nail clippers, nail files, toothbrush, wet wipes, sunscreen.

Center: Blankets, pillows, towels/wash cloths, twin sheets/pillowcases, HE (High Efficiency) liquid detergent, toilet paper, paper towels, tissues, bleach, dish soap, disposable gloves, plastic utensils.

Their February, 2018 newsletter states "Twenty-four women are off the street since May 17, when we opened the center." ~ Marilyn McKee and Sylvia Flagg

Book Report

If you have ever seen Renoir's large painting, "Luncheon of the Boating Party", it probably made you smile. More than a dozen congenial people enjoying each other's company on the terrace of a restaurant. From their attire, you can discern that they come from a variety of socio-economic levels, from the top-hatted gentleman in the background to the straw hatted rowers in the foreground. They are refreshing themselves after a day of boating on the Seine. And now they are modeling for the artist.

Susan Vreeland brings each of these characters to life as she crafts backstories from known history plus her own imagination to bring all of them into August Renoir's circle of friends. The young woman who was a mime at the Folies-Bergiere dreams of acting in legitimate theater; "I want to say beautiful words, brave words, unforgettable words." Her friends around the table promise to be first in line for tickets when she speaks onstage. The scene of relaxed gaiety hides the hard work Renoir put into this creation. He was almost desperate to prove to the stuffy academicians of the Paris Salon that a mere "impressionist" had the skill to create a great work of art. And he did.

This masterpiece resides at the Phillips Collection in Washington, D.C. The book was published in 2007, so you may find it in used-book stores or at the Pima County Public Library. Or you can borrow mine when we return in October. ~ Jeanne Myers

We do our best to look out for each other. We had decided that we were not going to become as involved as we had been before....and yet, here we are!!! Recipe

Pothole Cake

This is a recipe we received from my mother when we were living in Mozambique. It's an easy recipe, especially for kids who want to cook. Our daughters loved it!

Place the first five ingredients in a greased 9" x 13" baking pan and mix with a fork.

2 cups sugar	3 cups all purpose flour
2 teaspoons baking soda	1/2 cup cocoa
1/2 teaspoon salt	

Mix the next four ingredients together in a small bowl.

2 tablespoons vinegar	1/2 cup cooking oil
2 cups cold water	2 teaspoons vanilla

Make 16 or 20 scooped out places - potholes - in your dry mix. Add the combined liquids, pouring some into each hole. Mix with a fork until blended. Bake in a 350 degree oven for 35 - 40 minutes. ~ Mary Broughton
