SERVICE IN MISSION DURING SHELTER-IN-PLACE

As we are all comfortably and safely sheltered in our own homes with plenty to eat, there are many in our community who do not have shelter and who depend on community non-profits including Casa Maria Soup Kitchen for their next meal. Those community non-profits in turn depend on donations of food from Grocery stores, bakeries, restaurants and CHURCHES to name a few. These food donations from businesses are not available as markets are not experiencing surpluses and restaurants are closed.

DSUMC has partnered with Casa Maria Soup kitchen for many years, supporting it not only with dollars but with supplies, food and <u>VOLUNTEERS</u>. This is the largest soup kitchen in Tucson and feeds up to 400 homeless and low income members of our community daily.

Your Missions/Social Concerns team purchased and delivered the April scheduled supplies this week. The sign on the gate said "Pick up your lunch and move on." The Casa Maria workers were so appreciative of our delivery as always, but we were saddened to realize that those on the margin of our community are missing more than possibly smaller lunches and soup. They are missing the opportunity to sit for a while, eat in peace together at tables under a cover, and the opportunity to see and talk with those who care.

We can't change their situation but we can help to feed them!

2. Make 20-40 peanut butter and jelly sandwiches and seal them in sandwich bags. Deliver them between <u>9-10 a.m. every Saturday</u> to the red RAV4 in the parking lot of <u>ST. FRANCIS IN THE FOOTHILLS UMC</u> (corner of Swan and River Rd.). They will be delivered to Casa Maria that morning.

Holy Week comes to life!



My Maundy Thursday Story for 2020 Blessings, Pat Walker

I promised stories, so here is one of my own. It will make more sense if you have viewed the Desert Skies Maundy Thursday service on YouTube. It's long but I hope you will appreciate the energy and work it takes to create and stitch together a meaningful Worship Service.

I've been singing, reading, dramatizing and attending Maundy Thursday services over many years. But none like this one, this year. This year everything is different.

We know the Rest of the Story, so we don't, perhaps, pay attention when the soloist sings, "Were you There?". For me this year is very different. I was blessed to be part of the Socially Distancing group that filmed the Maundy Thursday service.

We gathered for filming on Wednesday night, April 1, a week and a day before it was to be on YouTube. There were 9 of us: Rev. Drs. Mark and Candace Lansberry, Dr. Alex Shawn, Gail Remaly, Stephanie and Scott Hartung, Dr. Raymond Ryder, Paige McDowell and me.

The experience was a moment in time strangely out of sequence. Because there were so few of us, everybody did double duty. The Rev. Drs. Lansberry organized and conducted the service, Candace read the prayers and introduced the Story, drew our attention to the table of symbols, helping us to partake in the ritual as we were able. She sang with our little choir. Rev. Mark read the scriptures and later, when we had all gone home, edited the raw material (there was a lot of this) into the nearly seamless service offered on Thursday night.

Gail sang a duet with Alex while Raymond accompanied and then she read the part of Mary, friend of Jesus. Scott and Stephanie filmed the service from the Audio Visual booth - Stephanie checked the sound and gave us our cues, Scott panned the camera and then read the part of Simon Peter because Scott Jones, who was supposed to be Peter, was ill. Allergies, thankfully.

Paige was Salome; not the Salome who danced and asked for the head of John the Baptist. No, this is St. Mary Salome, who stood at the foot of the cross. In our reading she tends to Jesus' dead body as women did in Jewish culture. Paige sang too.

Raymond accompanied our little choir in the hymns and prayer songs while we sat 6 feet apart in the Choir Loft. He played the Music for Gathering and the Offertory as well as reading the part of Judas. I remembered the painting by Rubens called "The Last Supper". You can look it up online by searching for the artist. Note whom Judas is looking at.

Alex not only dueted with Gail, he directed our little Distancing choir, sang "Basin and Towel" to remind us of Jesus' Mandate: "Love one another as I have loved you." He read the part of the Roman centurion who presided over Jesus' crucifixion. Strong, moving, and not often in complete sentences.

I read the part of Mary, the Mother. She speaks of mothers who have lost their children, to "plague and pestilence". We wanted our actors to be dressed in street clothes because, like those we became, we are just regular folks at a very special moment in history.

So, this is the long way around to tell you about how a Film gets put together, how much work and thought goes into a Worship Service and how the "players" gain insight and spiritual strength from the process itself.

Actions of Goodwill During the Easter Season: Things to Do While Sheltering in Place

The theme scripture says that the community keeps the "goodwill of all the people" at heart. So the concluding time raises a question for further reflection after the benediction such as "What message does the world need? What can we do for the goodwill of all the people?" Here are some ideas for practicing goodwill with all generations each week that allow you to use materials you probably have at home.

<u>Second Sunday of Easter-</u> Heartfelt Goodwill through "Hugs". Send a virtual hug through email or text message to someone who may be in need of one. Contact your pastor or congregational care team for contact info if you would like to send it to someone in your church who is homebound. Using a long piece of paper (or a few pieces glued together), trace your hands and arms. Cut out a heart and write a message of hope, joy, peace, or love, then glue the arms and hands to it to create a "hug." Sending physical mail is a little risky right now because surfaces can carry germs, so take picture of your "hugs" and send the photos digitally to anyone who may need a hug.

We are not hoarders. But when we started to run low on toilet paper, Lee decided it was time to make a Costco Run. They are now open between 8-9 am on Tuesday & Thursday for "Seniors" before opening the doors at 9 am for everyone else. Knowing there might be long lines, Lee took up the challenge and on Thursday, 26 March, he went to Costco, arriving at 7 am to find about 400 old people, "Seniors", ahead of him. Obviously he failed in his mission to get TP.

As many of you know, we get up early (3:30-4:00am) for our early morning walk, year round. Last Tuesday, 31 March, he woke up at 3:00, got dressed and headed for Costco. He took my cell phone (he refuses to have one of his own) so he could do crossword puzzles while he waited. Also a folding chair and water. And he was the first one in line at 3:30! He asked a worker near the front door if they had any TP and he said, "No". Lee: "Are you going to get any this morning?" "Let me check."


The worker said they were expecting 3 deliveries and that one of the trucks was a "paper" delivery truck and had TP on it. So Lee decided to stay in line. A few more people showed up around 5-5:30am, and more trickled in as the minutes click by. Again the line stretched on and on.

The Outside Manager came around before the doors opened and said the workers would have the TP lined up and ready to hand them out. They open the doors at 7:30 and Lee quickly picked up his TP, and a couple of other items and got out of there as fast as he could. We should be good to "go" for a couple of months!

Dear Members and Friends of the Desert Southwest Conference,

Grace and peace in the name of our risen Savior, Jesus Christ!

Here is an important announcement regarding our Annual Conference Session in June!

The COVID-19 virus continues to impact our life and ministry in the Conference. We have recently learned that the City of Mesa has extended the closure of various areas until further notice. This includes the Mesa Convention Center, the facility where Annual Conference 2020 was to be held.

We were advised that because of this closure, we are not permitted to hold our Annual Conference as planned. For those of you who are members of the Conference, and had made a reservation at the Delta Hotel, you may have already received notice that your hotel room has been cancelled. You need not do anything further related to this cancellation.

I am also informing you that because of the continuing concern about the spread of the COVID-19 virus, <u>we will not be</u> <u>holding Annual Conference in-person this year</u>. In order to complete the essential matters of the Annual Conference, alternative plans are being developed which we will be sharing with you as soon as possible. For the moment, I ask you to hold the dates of our Annual Conference (June 11-14, 2020) until we have decided on the alternate plans. Please watch for important updates and visit our <u>website</u> for more information.

In the meantime, I hold you in prayer, asking God to strengthen you and give you a profound faith that reminds us that God is with us even as we move in this uncertain time.
